MONKS RISBOROUGH, with the Hamlets of ASKETT, UPPER and LOWER CADSDEAN, MEADLE, OWLSWICK, and WHITELEAF.

MONKS RISBOROUGH is a parish, in the hundred of Aylesbury, union, county court district, and rural deanery of Wycombe, archdeaconry of Buckingham, and diocese of Oxford, distant 6½ miles from Great Missenden, 5 south-west from Wendover, and 9 north from High Wycombe. The church of St. Dunstan is a noble stone building, with square embattled tower; it has nave, chancel, and 5 bells: this church derives its name from the monks of St. Dunstan of Canterbury, who held possession of the same: Archbishop Potter was formerly rector of this parish: there is a brass, in a perfect state of preservation, bearing date 1431, in memory of the Rev. Robert Blundell, formerly curate. The living is a rectory, annual value £700, with residence, in the patronage of the Bishop of Oxford; the Rev. Thomas Evetts, M.A., of Corpus Christi College, Oxford, is the incumbent. There is a chapel for Baptists. Before the enclosure, which was completed in 1839, the inhabitants of the parish had the privilege of cutting beechwood from off a hill called the Scrubs, which right was at that time exchanged for certain portions of land allotted, in different parts of the parish, for the convenience of the poor parishioners, who are allowed to be the tenants,

and the rents are laid out in coal for distribution at Christmas. The trustees of the allotments are the rector, churchwardens, and constable for the time being. The population in 1861 was 985; the acreage is 3,220.

OWLSWICK is a small hamlet of the parish of Monks Risborough, from which it is distant one mile and a half, and 5 miles from Thame, in the hundred of Ashendon.

The White Cliff Cross is a gigantic cross cut into the chalky side of one of the Chiltern Hills; at the foot of the hill is the little hamlet of Whiteleaf: by the Enclosure Act, 9 Geo. IV., this "ancient memorial or land mark" is declared to be public property, and the lord of the manor compensated for its maintenance.

MOULSOE is a parish and small neat village, pleasantly situated on the top of a hill, distant from Newport Pagnell 3 miles, and 49 from London, in the hundred, union, county court district and rural deanery of Newport Pagnell, archdeaconry of Buckingham, and diocese of Oxford. The church of St. Mary is of Gothic architecture, and has a tower containing 4 bells. The living is a rectory, value £350, with

residence, in the gift of Lord Carington; the Rev. Walter Drake, M.A., of Christ's College, Cambridge, is the incumbent. Here is a Free school, supported by the rent of 14 acres of land, left by the Countess Dowager of Northampton. Lord Carington is lord of the manor. The population in 1861 was 234; the parish contains 1,190 acres.

MURSLEY is a village and parish, in ancient times a market town, 3½ miles north-east from Winslow, and 9 north-west from Leighton Buzzard, in Cottesloe hundred, Winslow union, county court district and archdeaconry of Buckingham, rural deanery of Mursley, and diocese of Oxford. The church of the Virgin Mary is a neatly built structure, with square tower, 6 bells, and a clock, standing on an eminence with commanding prospects. The living is a rectory, annual value about £350, with residence, and including 226 acres of glebe, in the gift of W. Selby-Lowndes, Esq., and held by the Rev. John Cross, A.K.C. Here is a Baptist chapel, also a

National Infant school. W. Selby-Lowndes, Esq. (lord of the manor), Lord Carington, and the Rev. John Athawes are the principal landowners. The population in 1861 was 482; the area is 2,840 acres; the soil is loamy, with some gravel and clay.

SALDEN is a hamlet, one mile north-east from Mursley, and 4½ east from Winslow; here was formerly a mansion of the Fortescue family, pulled down in 1743.
